Skills required:	You'll need: • customer service skills • to be thorough and pay attention to detail • patience and the ability to remain calm in stressful situations • excellent verbal communication skills • the ability to work well with others • to be flexible and open to change • the ability to work well with your hands • active listening skills • being able to use a computer terminal or hand-held device may be beneficial for this job.
What you'll do:	As a junior hairdresser, your tasks may include: • greeting customers • shampooing and conditioning hair • simple cutting • making sure towels and supplies are ready for use • keeping the salon clean and tidy As a senior hairdresser you'll talk to clients about how they want their hair done, give them advice and suggest style ideas.
	<ul> <li>Your tasks may include:</li> <li>cutting and styling</li> <li>colouring, perming or straightening</li> <li>advising on minor hair and scalp problems</li> <li>keeping client records, making appointments and taking payments</li> <li>ordering materials and promoting sales to customers</li> <li>keeping up to date with new trends, techniques and products</li> <li>making sure that hair products containing chemicals are used and stored safely</li> </ul>
